PubMed Improvements

If you have searched PubMed lately, you may have noticed the following new features in the database:

- You can add your "Favorite" citations to your existing Collections or create new
 ones using My NCBI. The PubMed abstracts display has an option "Save Items" to
 provide users with an easy way to add items to My NCBI Collections when you click
 on the "Favorite" button in your account when you are signed into MyNCBI. You can
 add "Favorite" citations to an existing collection or create new ones by adding items
 to a new My NCBI collection.
- Another PubMed improvement is making it easier to format references to send to a
 citation manager program by using the Citation Manager option in the Send to
 menu. Once you display your results in PubMed, go to the Send to menu and select
 Citation Manager, then click on the Create File button to download a text file (with
 a nbib extension) in the tagged MEDLINE format.

Cell Reports - A New Open Access Journal

Please check out the **new open-access** journal from Cell Press, called *Cell Reports*. Below is an overview from the publisher, Elsevier:

<u>Cell Reports</u> will place particular emphasis on shorter, single-point stories, called Reports. This journal is a high-profile, open-access place to publish intriguing, cutting-edge material that describes one or two key findings. These Reports are not meant for preliminary findings that are not well supported by the data, but they should represent a significant

advance in the field that will drive further research and perhaps even raise more questions than they answer.

<u>Cell Reports</u> includes a section for Resources, which describe significant technical advances and/or major informational data sets.

Open access means that readers will have immediate and unrestricted access to all papers published in *Cell Reports*. Authors will retain full copyright for their articles and can choose to publish their work in *Cell Reports* under Creative Commons licenses.
