Dr. C. J. Peters will present the lecture *Emerging Zoonotic Viral Infections: Do They Find Us or Do We Find Them?* on **Thursday, February 28, 2013 at 12:00 p.m. at the University of Texas Medical School Auditorium – MSB 3.001 (third floor)**

[Dr. Peters](#) (Center for Biodefense and Emerging Infectious Diseases, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston) will discuss the origins of microbial threats. Are they truly "new" or do they arise from mutation or translocation? How many are there? Can we predict them? What strategies can we use to control them?

### **BurnMed an iPhone App for Burn Victims**

This application for emergency treatment of burn victims, developed by Dr. Stephen Milner, Director of the [Johns Hopkins Burn Center](#), and Harry Goldberg, Director of Academic Computing at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine was inspired by a mass-casualty event in Kenya in which a gas tanker exploded. The app is designed to teach students and laymen how to stabilize a victim within the first eight hours after a burn.

The user draws the burned areas onto a 3-D anatomic figure. The app uses the updated diagram to calculate total body surface area burned and fluid resuscitation needs and also provides treatment guidelines summarizing essential steps in early management.

BurnMed uses a combination of video, photos and text to provide a quick yet thorough overview of how to handle burn victims
