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The Cochrane Library

The Cochrane Library is a unique source of reliable and up-to date information on the effects of interventions in health care. Published on a quarterly basis by Wiley Interscience, the Cochrane Library is designed to provide information and evidence to sup port decisions made in health care and to inform those receiving care.


The Cochrane Library consists of several evidence-based medicine databases including the Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews, DARE. **ČENTRAL** (the Cochrane Central Register of Controlled Trials), the Cochrane Database of Methodology Reviews, the Health Technology Assessment Database, and the NHS Economic Evaluation Database. Beginning in 2005, the Cochrane Library will also include the Cochrane Methodology Register.

The Cochrane Library website also offers a downloadable PowerPoint demonstration, a PDF user guide, and other tools to help navigate through the several databases included in this product.

Betsy Parish Past President of the Friends of the Texas Medical Center Library

On November 17, 2004, Betsy Parish stepped down as President of the Friends of the Texas Medical Center Library. For four years, her stewardship of the Friends led the HAM-TMC Library in new and exciting directions: outreach programs in consumer health for both Asians (CHIA) and Spanish Speakers (CHISS) were established and expanded, and the Friends confronted the issue of skyrocketing journal costs by creating and participating in Adopt-a-Journal, a program in which individuals can support the journal collection by purchasing a



three-year journal subscription at the institutional rate. Ms. Parish also encouraged the administration of new fundraising and marketing tactics, and the Friends recently voted to fund the Library's acquisition and implementation of The Raiser's Edge®, fundraising software used by the most successful non-profits in the country.

Her efforts on behalf of HAM-TMC Library are not ending with the conclusion of her presidency. She will remain on the board of the Friends, and has been named co-chair for the next Friends' fundraising gala, Houston's Most Fascinating 2005. Rogene Calvert, the Director of Personnel and Volunteer Initiatives Program in Mayor Bill White's Administration and a veteran board member, will succeed her. Already, Ms. Calvert has convened meetings to discuss new outreach proposals; the Library is indeed fortunate in its Friends.
